Plot Outline

A daimyo from a certain land is in need of a wife. Accompanied by his servant, Tarōkaja, he sets out on a pilgrimage to Nishinomiya Shrine, which is famous for the god of connections. The daimyo does not know the area they are traveling through, but believes that Tarōkaja is familiar with it, and makes him act as a tour guide. Tarōkaja, however, does not actually know anything about the area, but pretends he does, making up all kinds of stories about the sights. Eventually, the pair reach Nishinomiya Shrine. It is decided they will spend the night in the shrine precincts conducting an all-night vigil. Despite being disturbed many times by Tarōkaja, the daimyo falls asleep. In his dream, he is told that his wife will be waiting for him on the stairs of the Western gate. Delighted, he sets off for the gate. He picks up a fishing rod he sees on the ground and starts to fish, whereupon he catches a woman of unequaled beauty. The daimyo has a bamboo flask of sake with him, so the couple use that to celebrate their wedding on the spot.

So envious he cannot stand it, Tarōkaja borrows the fishing rod and casts the line, crying "Me too!" However, what does he catch? ...



Demachi Children's Kabuki Hikiyama Higashi Hikiyama Association

For more than 220 years, the Demachi Children's Kabuki Hikiyama has been part of the annual spring festival at Demachi Shinmeigu Shrine, heralding the arrival of spring in Tonamino. This festival takes place on April 29-30 every year.

There are three hikiyama floats — Nishimachi, Nakamachi, and Higashi. In the past, all three floats would perform each year.

Since 1969, it changed to having the floats take turns to perform each year. The Higashi Hikiyama Association comprises four districts — Higashimachi, Shinmachi, Kawaharamachi, and Kibunemachi. Cooperating across district boundaries, they continue to pass down the traditions.

Plot Outline

After vacating the daimyo's mansion in the Ōgigayatsu district of Kamakura, Ōboshi Yuranosuke and his family are now living quietly in Yamashina in Kyoto. People on the street are gossiping about when the retainers of Magistrate Enya will avenge their master, but the slovenly Yuranosuke appears to be totally absorbed in drink and women. On this night too, Yuranosuke has become very drunk at the Ichiriki Teahouse in Gion. It is here that Ōboshi Rikiya delivers to him a secret message from Magistrate Enya's wife, Kaoyo Gozen.

Hayano Kanpei's wife, Okaru, who is now a courtesan, is trying to sober up by the window on the second floor of the teahouse. Curious about the letter that Yuranosuke has started to read, Okaru uses a mirror to peek at the letter. Yuranosuke notices her in the act and proposes to pay to release her from bondage. He plans to kill her because she now also knows the secret. Okaru's older brother, Teraoka Heiemon, realizes Yuranosuke's true intent. Hoping to convince

Yuranosuke to let him join in the vengeance plot, he draws his sword and attenpts to kill Okaru himself.

Okaru is shocked, but when she is told that her father, Yoichibee has died and her husband, Kanpei, has committed seppuku, she resigns herself to her fate. Just



as Heiemon's sword is about to fall, he is stopped by Yuranosuke, who agrees to let Heiemon join him.

Shōohzangumi, Maibara Hikiyama Festival Preservation Society

The Maibara Hikiyama Festival Preservation Society is an organization whose objectives are the promotion of the Maibara Hikiyama Festival; the preservation of the hikiyama floats, and the cultivation of Kyōgen theater and hayashi music.

The Maibara Hikiyama Festival is an annual festival of the Yutani Shrine, that protects the district. It is believed to have begun in the second half of the Edo Period (1603-1868), emulating the Hikiyama Festival of Nagahama. The hikiyama floats are believed to have been built and the Hikiyma Kyogen performances begun in the Meiwa Era (1764-72), when the town started to flourish as an important transport

hub. The floats have been rebuilt and repaired numerous times since then and are still treasured today.

The Hikiyama Festival takes place duning Health and Sports Day long weekend in October. It is divided into three kumi or groups, namely the Asahiyamagumi (Kitamachi), Shōohzangumi (Nakamachi), and Juzangumi. In all three kumi, the youth groups play the main role in organizing and running the festival, with sewakata (older members who have graduated from the youth group) guiding them. The actors in the Children's Kabuki are all boys from first to sixth grade in the respective districts' elementary schools.

Plot Outline

Disguised as shinobu fern sellers, Matsuwakamaru and Okumi arrive at the Yabase wharf, where Oshizu the ferrywoman is waiting. When they learn of Princess Nowake's violent death, they burn a fukusa cloth, a memento of Princess Nowake, to pray for the repose of her soul. Then, a woman who is the spitting image of Okumi suddenly appears. In an attempt to determine which is the real Okumi, Oshizu commands Okumi and the Okumi look-alike to describe how they first met Matsuwakamaru, but the two women will not budge in their battle over the man. The false Okumi eventually reveals her true identity - the terrifying form is a combination of the ghost of Hōkaibō, a corrupt monk who had been killed while in love with Okumi and that of Princess Nowake, who had been killed by Hōkaibō while still obsessed with Matsuwakamaru. At that moment, Tawara no Tōta comes along and, together with the powers of the Kanzeon, makes the ghosts disappear.



Honmachigumi Kasugazan, Nagahama Hikiyama Festival

Honmachigumi Kasugazan is one of the 13 float kumi that take part in the Nagahama Hikiyama Festival, an annual spring festival of Nagahama Hachimangu Shrine. This notable festival's history goes back more than 400 years, and last year was registered on UNESCO's List of Intangible Cultural Heritage.

Inheriting the history and traditions of Honmachigumi Kasugazan, the

older, youth, and children actors and hayashi music performers have continued to pass down the culture of the Hikiyama Festival in a long and uninterrupted line from parent to child and onto their own children. The elaborate and gorgeous hikiyama floats and the children's kabuki performed on top of those floats are a magnificent sight to behold.

Plot Outline

Minamoto-no-Yoshitsune had distinguished himself in military victory against the Taira clan, but he has fallen out of favor with his older brother, the powerful Yoritomo, and is now running for his life. Yoshitsune and a small band of followers disguise themselves as traveling Buddhist monks, and, with Benkei as their leader, make haste along the Hokuriku Road with the intent of taking refuge with the Fujiwara clan in Ōshū. Meanwhile, Yoritomo has set up checkpoints all along the road to Ōshū in the hope of capturing Yoshitsune.

When Yoshitsune's band approaches the Ataka Checkpoint, they are stopped by the chief guard, Togashi. In the face of Togashi's questioning, Benkei pretends that a blank scroll he happens to have on him is a Kanjinchō, a letter soliciting donations for the rebuilding of Tōdaiji temple in Nara, and pretends to read a long letter. This satisfies Togashi, who allows them to pass. However, when a checkpoint guard protests, 'One of them looks like Yoshitsune,' Togashi

calls for the group to halt again, and the atmosphere at the checkpoint becomes very tense. To dispel their suspicions, Benkei starts to beat Yoshitsune violently with his staff. Togashi is so moved by Benkei's desire to protect his master to the



extent of carrying out such a disrespectful act, that he lets the group pass the checkpoint, even while knowing that they are Yoshitsune and his servants.

This is a moving tale of three men, Benkei, Yoshitsune, and Togashi, and their "intelligence, benevolence, and bravery." Even today, some 800 years later, it never fails to capture the hearts of the Japanese people.

Children's Kabuki Kanjinchō Organizing Committee

The city of Komatsu is the location of the Ataka Checkpoint, which is the setting of Kabuki Jūhachiban no Uchi, Kanjinchō, or Kanjinchō of the Eighteen Best Kabuki Plays. The Hikiyama Children's Kabuki is performed at Komatsu's Otabi Festival every year in May, with this year marking the 250th year it has been performed. The National Children's Kabuki Festival in Komatsu began in 1999, and Kanjinchō is performed every year.

Elementary and junior high school children play the on-stage roles, and children from elementary, junior and senior high school play a central part in the nagauta songs and the hayashi music. This kind of performance of Kanjinchō, with children acting, singing and playing the music, is very rare in Japan, and it serves to pass down the culture of Kabuki, which has continued since feudal times.
